4. <u>NEW BUSINESS</u>

A. Ordinance amending the 2021 Annual Budget

City Treasurer Cordray explained that staff monitoring and review of fund and department budgets identified budget accounts to be amended. An ordinance was prepared to provide for the amending of the 2021 Annual Budget to accommodate the changes in sources and uses. He also informed Council that Cliff Lewis with Grandview Lumber paid off the East Wine Country Plaza SIED Loan which would also require a budget amendment. By fund the highlights of the budget changes were:

- Current Expense Fund: Increased appropriations for Parks Maintenance Office & Operating Supplies for Norm Childress signage. Net effect was a decrease to estimated ending fund balance.
- SIED Loan EWC Plaza Fund: Increased revenues for Loan Payment Received Grandview Lumber. Increased appropriations for SIED Loan Principal. There would be no effect to estimated ending fund balance.

Discussion took place.

B. R-1P Single-Family Residential Park District – Roof Slope Construction

City Administrator Arteaga explained that on May 5, 2021, the Mayor and Council received a letter from Holly Castle requesting that the City change the minimum roof slope requirements in the R-1P Single-Family Residential Park District. The Sandy Lane and Vista Drive area of the City was the only neighborhood that was zoned R-1P Single-Family Residential Park District. This area consisted of 38 mobile/manufactured homes. The MR Manufactured Home Park District does not require the minimum 5/12 pitch roof. The reason for the change request was primarily due to cost and availability of homes that meet this requirement. The manufacturers that build these homes with the 5/12 roof pitch option would usually complete the roof structure onsite. This was due to the added height of the home and height restrictions to meet DOT standards for transport on the highway. Staff did not see any negative neighborhood impacts from making this change and recommended that Grandview Municipal Code Chapter 17.36.080 Area regulations – Construction and siting standards (A) Roof Slope be amended to allow a minimum of 3/12 roof pitch.

Let me suggest to the Council a road map for where we want to go. If you review the Handbook from Municipal Research, they point to establishing a set of priorities by the elected officials. Tonight is the first step toward having a set of priorities that reflect the direction the City wants to go.

This meeting is just the first step in the process. It will require thought and work. When John Kennedy talked about going to the moon and back in the 60's he said that we should adopt that goal, not because it was easy but because it was hard.

I suggest for tonight's meeting we try and keep it to an hour. I suggest that everyone have six minutes time to speak, that the end of six minutes per person we have two minutes for people to ask clarify questions about the ideas that others have put forward. In addition to the ideas that are articulated, everyone is invited to have a more extensive list in writing. All of the ideas whether presented orally or in writing, will be reduced to individual lists (yes, there can be duplicates). Those lists will be collected by the Clerk, who will provide a packet of all of the lists and supply them to the Mayor and Council members. Each member of the team will rank all of ideas from 1 to 100 (if there are that many) These ranked lists will be given to everyone. Because at the next meeting----I suggest in about two weeks, and will be led by a facilitator at the end of that meeting we should have the draft "Elected Officials" Priority list. Because we do not want meetings that go for hours and hours, it may take a couple of meetings to get to that list.

The next step will be to encourage Staff and Citizens to contribute their ideas. To integrate all of this, we need to schedule a Work Shop with all of the elected officials, the staff and public. We can have this meeting in location other than the City Hall if that is your wish. It should be led by a facilitator and will take most of a day. At end of the meeting we should have priority list and we should have begun putting together specific measurable plans for achieving each goal.

We need to get this done before end of July, because work on the Budget begins in August.



AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF GRANDVIEW, WASHINGTON, AMENDING SECTION 17.36.080(A) AREA REGULATIONS – CONSTRUCTION AND SITING STANDARDS – ROOF SLOPE IN THE R-1 P SINGLE-FAMILY RESIDENTIAL PARK DISTRICT

WHEREAS, Grandview Municipal Code Section 17.36.080(A) Roof Slope provides for a 5/12 pitch roof; and,

WHEREAS, the City wishes to amend GMC Section 17.36.080(A) to provide for a 3/12 pitch roof,

Section 1. Grandview Municipal Code Section 17.36.080(A), Area regulations – Construction and siting standards – Roof Slope, which currently reads as follows:

A. Roof Slope. Roof slope shall be not less than a five-foot rise for each 12 feet of horizontal run.

is hereby amended to read as follows:

A. Roof Slope. Roof slope shall be not less than a three-foot rise for each 12 feet of horizontal run.

Section 2. Except as set forth herein, all other provisions of Chapter 17.36.080 Grandview Municipal Code remain unchanged.

Section 5. This ordinance shall be in full force and effect five days after its passage and publication as required by law.


