ITEM HISTORY (Previous council reviews, action related to this item, and other pertinent history)

Yakima County Multi-Jurisdictional Hazard Mitigation Plan was last updated in 2015. This is a County-wide plan that identifies possible hazards that could occur throughout Yakima County. The plan then looks at how often that hazard could occur, identifies how significant of a problem those hazards could be and then identifies possible action plans to try and mitigate those hazards. The plan is supposed to be updated every 5 years.

ITEM COMMENTARY (Background, discussion, key points, recommendations, etc.) Please identify any or all impacts this proposed action would have on the City budget, personnel resources, and/or residents.

The Yakima Valley Emergency Management Office hired Integrated Solutions Consulting to lead the process of completing the 5-year plan update. They then invited all of the jurisdictions and fire districts in the County to participate in the update process. Participation in updating the plan means that the City of Grandview's hazards are identified and addressed in the plan. It also allows the opportunity to use this information to improve the City's chances of receiving grants in the future if they become available to address any of these types of hazards. Chief Mason has been participating in these meetings as a representative for the City of Grandview. The monthly meetings started in March and conclude this month with a draft plan. The draft plan is then forwarded to Washington State for review and then to FEMA for review. Once it comes back from FEMA and any concerns are worked out, it'll come before the City Council around March or April of 2023 to be adopted by the City of Grandview.

ACTION PROPOSED

This agenda item is for presentation purposes only to make the Mayor and City Council aware of what is going on. No action is required at this time.

City of Grandview

Grandview is located near the eastern border of Yakima County in south-central Washington State. Grandview is equidistant, 40 miles, from the city of Yakima and the Tri-Cities of Richland, Pasco, and Kennewick. Grandview is located along I-82, north of the Yakima River and surrounded by agricultural lands. The cities neighbors include Sunnyside to the northwest and Prosser to the southeast, both along I-82. As of the 2020 Census, the City's population was 11,075. Grandview encompasses about 6.3 square miles.

Hazard Identification and Risk Assessment

Representatives of the City of Grandview actively participated in the 2022 HMP Update as members of the planning committee. In addition to the countywide risk assessment, the City of Grandview identified the hazards that affect the city and revised the risk assessment to reflect probability, frequency, and potential impacts, as summarized in **Table 1-A** below. In the context of the countywide planning area, there are no hazards that are unique to the City of Grandview. Information on past events for each hazard can be found in Section 3 (Hazard Identification and Risk Assessment) in the base plan.

Both Flood and Dam/Levee Failure risk levels are lower for Grandview than Yakima County as a whole, given the higher elevation of the city and location outside of both the 100-year floodplain and any mapped dam inundation areas. Risk levels for other hazards/threats are consistent with the county rankings. Specific hazard areas and vulnerabilities are described below.

- Avalanche: The City of Grandview is located outside of the identified avalanche hazard area and is not located along a transportation corridor that may be disrupted from a significant incident.
- Drought: Drought can impact the entirety of Yakima County, including Grandview. Irrigation
 water sources are split between city-owned wells and the Sunnyside Valley Irrigation District
 (Sunnyside Canal). The Grandview Municipal Code includes a provision for water conversation
 measures during a drought declaration, which has not been implemented since the 1990's.
- Earthquake: The seismic risk for Grandview is consistent with all of Yakima County. There are no
 active fault lines within or surrounding Grandview. The city's downtown core would be
 vulnerable to a significant earthquake event, given the age of most buildings. Critical facilities in
 Grandview, including water and wastewater, are built to current seismic standards.
- Extreme Temperatures: Extreme temperatures can impact the entirety of Yakima County, including Grandview. Grandview has two assisted living facilities The Orchards and Grandview Assisted Living who's residents may be more vulnerable to extreme heat events. There are also several group homes in the city and a large elderly population that are considered vulnerable. Extreme temperatures are expected to have an impact on the local agricultural industry if they are long duration or particularly severe.
- Flood: Grandview does not have any land located within the 100-year floodplain. The Euclid Lift
 Station, part of the City's wastewater treatment system, was at risk to flooding during the 1996
 flooding event. The facility did not ultimately flood, but flooding at the facility could cause
 significant disruptions to the wastewater infrastructure. As noted above, the Sunnyside Canal is
 a potential source of flooding if it were to fail or be otherwise compromised.
- Landslide: Grandview has a low susceptibility and low incidence of landslides. There is no history
 of landslides or other geologic hazards in Grandview.
- Severe Weather: Severe weather can impact the entirety of Yakima County, including
 Grandview. There is some historic record of severe storms in the areas surrounding Grandview
 (including hail and wind events), but no specific damages within city limits. Vulnerable
 populations are noted above under the Extreme Temperatures hazard.
- Severe Winter Weather: Severe winter weather can impact the entirety of Yakima County, including Grandview. Heavy snow fall in 2001 caused some property damage, including collapsed roofs. Most critical facilities in Grandview are prepared with back-up power sources, including the fire station and police station, as well as some wells and lift stations. Grandview has identified the need for back-up power at several additional well sites, as well as local sheltering facilities. Vulnerable populations are noted above under the Extreme Temperatures hazard.
- Volcanic Eruption: Volcanic hazards, specifically ash fall, can impact the entirety of Yakima County, including Grandview. The city is not located within the Mt. Adams volcano hazard zone.
- WUI Fire: Grandview does not have a higher wildfire hazard potential than other Yakima County communities. Large fires have burned in the Rattlesnake Hills north of the city, including the 2016 Range 12 fire. Due to its location on I-82, Grandview experiences limited impacts from transportation disruptions from wildfires. Grandview owns a wastewater facility site, about 1,000 acres of land, just south of the city. The facility is mostly surrounded by wildland, including sagebrush and grasses. In July 2022, about 500 acres of the property burned after a wildland fire jumped over the Yakima River. At the time of plan development, the City estimated approximately \$1 million in insurance claims. The Grandview Fire Department is still assessing

potential mitigation actions, but there is a need to increased preparedness planning to protect the site, increase fire breaks, and potentially secure specialized firefighting resources to mitigate wildfire damages in the future.

- Dam/Levee Failure: Grandview is not located directly within the inundation area of any dams.
- Hazardous Materials: Grandview is at risk from hazardous materials traveling on I-82 and on the
 Burlington Northern Railroad, both of which pass through the city. Grandview experienced a fire
 in the early 2000's at the Wilbur-Ellis Site that closed I-82 for approximately 24 hours and
 required nearby evacuations. The Wilbur-Ellis site is one of two large suppliers of agricultural
 chemicals and fertilizers. Grandview is also home to several coal storage warehouses that are
 known to store anhydrous ammonia. Grandview experiences occasional hazardous materials
 releases from fixed facilities as well as from agricultural transportation along local roadways.

Capability Assessment

Capabilities are the programs and policies currently in use that could be used to implement the hazard mitigation strategy. Local capabilities may include regulatory tools such as plans and ordinances, administrative and technical expertise, or fiscal resources.

Regulatory Capabilities

Grandview last updated its Comprehensive Plan in 2016, and the municipal code was last updated and adopted in November 2021. **Table 1-B** lists key indicators of legal and regulatory capability to implement mitigation projects that are specific to the City of Grandview.

(Previous council reviews, action related to this item, and other pertinent history)

The Interlocal Agreement Among and Between City of Grandview, City of Mabton, City of Prosser and City of Sunnyside regarding the Cooperative Use of Facilities, Equipment and Personnel was agreed upon and signed into existence in November 2011. In "Section 4. Master Agreement", the Interlocal Agreement allows for the different cities to execute a "Specific Project Agreement" once approved by the appropriate legislative bodies and signed by the appropriate City Administrator/Managers. This Specific Project Agreement would allow us to share an employee and designate the cost/fee in doing so.

ITEM COMMENTARY (Background, discussion, key points, recommendations, etc.) Please identify any or all impacts this proposed action would have on the City budget, personnel resources, and/or residents.

During the process of putting together and approving the 2022 Budget, the City Council approved the concept and funding for the Fire Department to pay for two part-time employees to oversee and implement the training programs and record keeping for the Fire Department. One of those two people would be a Sunnyside Fire Department employee and the other would be a part-time employee/contractor that would work in-house. The first step of implementing this program is partnering with the Sunnyside Fire Department. This part of the process has been delayed due to staffing shortages in Sunnyside. They now have the staffing available and we are looking to move this project forward. The revenues to do this project are already in the 2022 Budget in the EMS category.

ACTION PROPOSED

Move a resolution authorizing the City Administrator to sign a Specific Project Agreement with the City of Sunnyside for the Grandview Fire Department and the Sunnyside Fire Department to share the services of a Sunnyside Fire Department employee to a regular Council meeting for consideration.

Grandview FD / Sunnyside FD Assistant Chief Agreement Breakdown

It's the goal of the Grandview and Sunnyside Fire Department's to handle the emergency and non-emergency needs of our communities in as professional and efficient way as possible. This means providing the best service possible to our community members, while at the same time, doing everything we can to keep the cost of doing that as minimal as possible. Some of our efforts in regards to achieving this goal include:

- Utilizing personnel and equipment from both departments jointly to the extent possible to maximize the public safety abilities of both communities.
- Keeping our personnel as well trained to be able to do their jobs as possible.
- Sharing in the cost to provide this training to the maximum extent possible.
- Keeping our departments up to date in regards to the equipment we have, to do the job with.
- Maintaining the highest number of well trained, highly qualified Volunteer Firefighters as possible to keep labor costs to a minimum.

In addition, we have identified that one of the significant needs in recruiting new Volunteers is to provide the opportunity for people to join an organization where they will receive top notch training that results in certifications that are recognized throughout the industry. This then provides them with the opportunity to use that training to better themselves in today's work environment. By implementing National Training Standards, we also meet the requirements of the WA State WAC's and decrease potential liability to the Cities of Grandview and Sunnyside.

With this goal, these identified needs and the realization concerning recruiting Volunteers in today's environment, it's our desire to share in the cost of one of our Training Officers. Some of the details involving cost and what the expected benefits will be are listed below.

Cost: \$2,000 per Month / \$24,000 Annually

Time Allotment: Based on call volume and money – This agreement will equate to approximately 20% of the Assistant Chief's regular work hours being utilized to accomplish work that will directly benefit Grandview FD. This equates to an average of 8 hours per week.

Overview of Types of Work to be Included: (This is not an all-inclusive list and other items will be added as the need is identified)

- Identify the emergency and non-emergency operational needs of the departments.
- Oversee the development and implementation of the Department's training programs and partnerships for firefighting, emergency and non-emergency medical services, hazardous materials, and other emergency response services and programs.

- Develop, implement and coordinate joint training programs, master calendars and schedules.
- Coordinate training needs, ongoing training requirements and maintenance of personnel certifications with the Grandview FD instructor personnel.
- Oversight and assisting with preparation and conducting of training needs for the department. This includes things like:
 - o Wednesday night training drills.
 - Saturday training drills.
 - Preparing and monitoring personnel going through firefighter recruit training to become IFSAC Firefighter 1 Certified.
 - o Prepare and monitor personnel needing to take Advanced First Aid training.
 - Preparing and monitoring personnel going through hazardous materials awareness training to become IFSAC Certified.
 - Preparing and monitoring personnel going through hazardous materials operations training to become IFSAC Certified.
 - Preparing and monitoring personnel going through Emergency Medical Technician training to become Certified EMT's.
 - Monitoring personnel and coordinating training opportunities for personnel to complete Ongoing Training and Evaluation Program (OTEP) requirements so they can maintain their certifications.
 - Assisting with providing this training to personnel as needed.
 - Preparing and instructing personnel in getting their Emergency Vehicle Incident Prevention (EVIP) Certification.
 - Monitoring and coordinating training opportunities for people to meet the annual training requirements in the areas of Blood Born Pathogens, Asbestos training, driver training, Incident Command training and other required annual training.
 - Monitoring and coordinating training opportunities for people to meet the quarterly training requirements for Self-Contained Breathing Apparatus (SCBA).
 - Monitoring and coordinating training opportunities for people to meet the training requirements for participating in live fire training.
 - Assisting with career and volunteer staff in development of supervisory, interpersonal communications, conflict resolution and project/program management skills.
 - Preparing and monitoring personnel wishing to accomplish more in-depth training in the areas of IFSAC Firefighter 2, Fire officer 1, Fire Officer 2, Instructor 1, Instructor 2, Advanced EMT, Certified Fire Investigator and others.
 - Monitoring personnel's training needs and matching those up with training opportunities when they become available to keep personnel moving forward in their career development.

- Responding to emergencies and calls for assistance.
- Assisting with Duty Officer coverage responsibilities during normal business hours when Grandview staff needs assistance.
- Research, identify and develop regional fire and EMS grant applications mutually beneficial to Grandview and Sunnyside.
- Act as a liaison between departments to resolve concerns and improve clear lines of communication.
- And other duties as deemed necessary.

An additional benefit in providing training in this manner is the team building potential. The more the personnel from the two departments train and work together, the more the personnel will come to trust and depend on each other. This then enables us to increase our overall ability to meet the needs of both communities by having a larger personnel pool and resources to draw from with a larger knowledge base to accomplish the tasks given to us.

Chief Anderson and I believe that this joint agreement can be put in place by creating a "Specific Project Agreement" between the City of Grandview and the City of Sunnyside under the existing "Interlocal Agreement Among and Between City of Grandview, City of Mabton, City of Prosser and City of Sunnyside Regarding the Cooperative Use of Facilities, Equipment and Personnel" that was put in place 2011.

We're requesting that the attached "Specific Project Agreement" be considered for adoption and added to the current agreement. The money for this was already approved and included in the 2022 Fire Department Budget. The position/person that this agreement would be used for has recently been hired by the City of Sunnyside and is scheduled to start work on September 26, 2022.

INTERLOCAL AGREEMENT AMONG AND BETWEEN CITY OF GRANDVIEW, CITY OF MABTON, CITY OF PROSSER AND CITY OF SUNNYSIDE REGARDING THE COOPERATIVE USE OF FACILITIES, EQUIMENT AND PERSONNEL

THIS INTERLOCAL AGREEMENT is entered into by, between and among the parties named herein for the uses and purpose stated below pursuant to the authority of Chapter 39.34 RCW and applicable law.

Section 1. PARTIES

The parties to this Agreement are:

- A. CITY OF PROSSER, hereinafter called "PROSSER," is a municipal corporation of the State of Washington with City Hall located at 601 7th Street, Prosser, Washington 99350.
- B. CITY OF GRANDVIEW, hereinafter called "GRANDVIEW," is a municipal corporation of the State of Washington with City Hall located at 207 West Second Street, Grandview, Washington 98930.
- C. CITY OF SUNNYSIDE, hereinafter called "SUNNYSIDE," is a municipal corporation of the State of Washington with City Hall located at 818 East Edison Avenue, Sunnyside, Washington 98944.
- D. CITY OF MABTON, hereinafter called "MABTON," is a municipal corporation of the State of Washington with City Hall located at 305 Main Street, Mabton, Washington 98935.

SECTION 2. AUTHORITY

Each of the parties is authorized to enter into this Interlocal Agreement (hereafter "Agreement") pursuant to Chapter 39.34 RCW which permits local governmental units to make the most efficient use of their powers by enabling them to cooperate with other localities on a basis of mutual advantage and thereby to provide services and facilities in a manner and pursuant to forms of governmental organization that will accord best with geographic, economic, population and other factors influencing the needs and development of local communities.

SECTION 3. PURPOSE

The parties named above desire to formalize an operational framework that will encourage and promote the coordination and use of facilities and resources of each and all parties in accordance with the authority cited in Section 2 above.

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual covenants, conditions and benefits herein, the parties agree as follows:

SECTION 4. MASTER AGREEMENT

The City Administrator of PROSSER, the City Administrator of GRANDVIEW, the City Manager of SUNNYSIDE and the Mayor of MABTON (hereafter collectively called "Executive Officers") are hereby authorized to execute one or more separate agreements that, by this reference, shall become part of this Agreement, provided that such separate agreements are signed by the parties participating in the specific undertaking and reference this Agreement. The separate agreements shall address issues relating to share of facilities and/or resources controlled or owned by the parties or any of them. Such separate agreements (hereafter "Specific Project Agreements") may address any matter of mutual concern or benefit, and may include, but are not limited to, the following:

- Use of facilities, equipment, personnel
- Access to facilities, equipment, personnel
- Operation and maintenance of facilities
- Operation of programs
- Charges, costs or fees
- Site improvements
- Times, dates and duration of use or access to equipment and facilities
- Joint purchasing
- Joint services

Prior to execution of any Specific Project Agreement, each party shall obtain any and all necessary and appropriate approvals from their respective legislative bodies.

SECTION 5. ADMINISTRATION

- 5.1 <u>Joint Board</u>. This Agreement shall not create any separate legal entity. This Agreement shall be administered by a Joint Board consisting of the Executive Officers, who shall meet and confer at such times deemed necessary and appropriate for the efficient conduct of business pertaining to such administration. Each Executive Officer shall be responsible for reporting the conduct of such administration to their respective legislative bodies.
- 5.2 <u>Budgets and Costs of Administration for Joint Projects</u>. Fiscal matters and descriptions of any shared services, programs, facilities and equipment, including budget and costs of administration of projects set forth in Specific Project Agreements pursuant to Section 4 above, and each party's responsibilities delineated therein.
- 5.3 Operating Fund. Nevertheless, the Joint Board may create any operating fund authorized by law, including but not limited to, establishment of a special fund with a state, county, city, or district treasurer servicing an involved public agency designated "Operating fund of Prosser-Grandview-Sunnyside-Mabton Joint Board."

- 5.4 Acquisition and Disposition of Property. Any real or personal property acquired shall be pursuant to Separate Project Agreement pursuant to Section 4 above, which shall address the means of acquisition, funding of acquisition, use and disposition of such property. Disposition of any real or personal property acquired pursuant to this Agreement but not addressed in any Separate Project Agreement, or as otherwise agreed in writing, shall be disposed of as follows:
 - (a) In the event of termination by all parties to any Separate Project Agreement, such property shall be sold. Proceeds from any sale of property shall be divided and paid to each party in proportion to the amount contributed by such party for the acquisition thereof. For any property not sold, title shall vest in each party in proportion to the amount contributed by each party for the acquisition thereof as tenants in common.
 - (b) In the event of termination by one party to any Separate Project Agreement, leaving two parties participating, the terminating party shall be paid and reimbursed the amount originally contributed by the terminating party for the acquisition of such property, less applicable depreciation.

No provision of this Agreement or Separate Project Agreement made pursuant to this Agreement shall relieve any public agency of any obligation or responsibility imposed upon it by law except that:

- (a) To the event of actual and timely performance thereof by a joint board or other legal or administrative entity created by an agreement made pursuant to this chapter, the performance may be offered in satisfaction of the obligation or responsibility; and
- (b) With respect to one or more public agencies purchasing or otherwise contracting through a bid, proposal, or contract awarded by another public agency or by a group of public agencies, any statutory obligation to provide notice for bids or proposals that applies to the public agencies involved is satisfied if the public agency or group of public agencies that awarded the bid proposal, or contract complied with its own statutory requirements and either (i) posted the bid or solicitation notice on a web site established and maintained by a public agency, purchasing cooperative, or similar service provider, for purposes of posting public notice of bid or proposal solicitations, or (ii) provided an access link on the state's web portal to the notice.

SECTION 6. INDEMNIFICATION

Each party shall defend, indemnify and hold harmless the other party, its elected officials, officers, agents, volunteers or assigns from any and all claims, demands, losses, liens, damages, actions, employees, judgments, liabilities, penalties, fines, lawsuits, costs and expenses (including attorney fees) which result from, arise out of, or are incidental to the indemnifying party's performance or failure to perform under this Agreement.

This section shall survive the termination of this Agreement.

SECTION 7. INSURANCE

Each party shall obtain or maintain in effect sufficient liability and property insurance to cover its participation in the programs and projects entered into pursuant to this Agreement. The parties agree and understand that specific projects or programs may require issuance of separate insurance coverage, which costs and responsibilities will be addressed in each Separate Project Agreement.

SECTION 8. TERMINATION - EFFECT

Any party may terminate its participation in this Agreement upon one year's advance written notice to the other parties. Upon termination, the terminating party shall remain responsible for payment of any financial commitment undertaken pursuant to any individual Separate Project Agreement, which financial commitment represents payment for services already performed.

SECTION 9. DISPUTE RESOLUTION

In the event of any dispute or difference arising by reason of this Agreement or any provision or term thereof or the use and/or payment for any facility for the purpose of this Agreement, the dispute or difference shall be attempted to be resolved by the Joint Board. If the dispute or difference is unable to be resolved by the Joint Board, the matters shall be referred to the legislative bodies of the affected parties for resolution. Such decision shall be arrived at as expeditiously as possible.

SECTION 10. THIRD PARTY BENEFICIARIES

There are no third party beneficiaries to this Agreement, and this Agreement shall not be interpreted or construed to create such rights.

SECTION 11. INTEGRATED AGREEMENT - AMENDMENT

This Agreement, with and each Specific Project Agreement hereafter attached and incorporated herein, constitutes the entire agreement between the parties, which shall not be amended except in writing signed by all parties.

SECTION 12. GENERAL PROVISIONS

- 12.1 This Agreement shall be effective upon the date signed by the last party to execute the Agreement. This Agreement may be executed in counterpart.
- 12.2 A copy of this Agreement shall be filed with the applicable County Auditor's offices, or in lieu of filing this Agreement with the County Auditors, each party may list a copy of this Agreement on its website pursuant to RCW 39.34.040.

I. RECITALS

THIS	SPECIFIC PROJECT AGREEMENT is entered into this	_ day of

WHEREAS, Sunnyside created and filled a position in its fire department and now employs an Assistant Chief – Medical Services Officer; and

WHEREAS, the Medical Services Officer, is a non-represented FLSA-Exempt position that performs a broad range of highly technical executive skills and subject matter expertise regarding fire and EMS funding, operations, education, and training, quality assurance, quality improvement, compliance and safety; and

WHEREAS, the Medical Services Officer, serves as an EMS Programs Training Director to oversee and participate in the funding, development, scheduling, instruction and evaluation of regional fire and EMS training and education programs; and

WHEREAS, both Sunnyside and Grandview seek to cooperatively seek local, state and federal funding to regionally train fire and EMS personnel to national standards, professional qualifications, and industry best practices to improve public safety operations, training and compliance through shared use of the Medical Services Officer; and

WHEREAS, Sunnyside, Grandview, Mabton and Prosser executed an Interlocal Agreement pursuant to RCW 39.34 to share facilities, equipment and personnel; and

WHEREAS, the Interlocal Agreement authorizes the parties to execute one or more separate "Specific Project Agreements" to address any matter of mutual concern or benefit; and

WHEREAS, Sunnyside has determined that, at time of writing, incidents occurring within the municipal boundaries of Grandview account for approximately twenty (20) percent of Sunnyside's call volume; and

WHEREAS, Grandview seeks to contribute \$24,000 per annum to use Sunnyside's Medical Services Officer up to twenty (20) percent or 0.2 FTE under this special project agreement; and

WHEREAS, both Sunnyside and Grandview City Councils determine that cooperation and sharing of the Medical Services Officer is in the public's best interest and mutually beneficial to both Sunnyside and Grandview, NOW

II. AGREEMENT

WHEREFORE, in consideration of the following covenants, conditions and promises herein, the parties mutually agrees as follows:

- 1. Sunnyside agrees to share use of its Medical Services Officer and resources to benefit both Grandview and Sunnyside.
- 2. Sunnyside will retain status as Employer for the Medical Services Officer and will meet all local, state and federal requirements in that capacity.

- 3. While shared, the Medical Services Officer shall provide professional services and may perform duties described in the Assistant Chief Medical Services Officer job description to the benefit of Grandview.
- 4. While shared, the Medical Services Officer may research, identify and develop regional fire and EMS grant applications mutually beneficial to Grandview and Sunnyside.
- In the event, Grandview identifies duties that would benefit public safety not found in the aforementioned job description, Grandview may request Sunnyside to amend said job description.
- 6. The Fire Chiefs from Sunnyside and Grandview will cooperatively determine an appropriate sharing schedule for the Medical Services Officer to the operational convenience and mutual benefit of both parties.
- The parties envision that the Medical Services Officer will serve Sunnyside eighty (80)
 percent of the time or 0.8 FTE, and Grandview twenty (20) percent of the time, or 0.2 FTE on
 average, excluding approved leave used at the MSO's request.
- 8. Grandview will reimburse Sunnyside \$2,000.00 dollars per month or portion thereof for any month in which Grandview utilizes the professional services or duties authorized under this agreement.
- 9. The term of this special project agreement shall be from the date of execution and shall automatically renew thereafter from January 1 to December 31st of each year, absent written notice of termination or withdrawal. Any request for termination or withdrawal from this agreement by either party shall be submitted at least sixty (60) days prior to December 31st of any year.

A self-contained breathing apparatus air compressor was purchased in October 2005 through an Assistance to Firefighter's Grant. The SCBA is a MSA Hypres #HP7000-NA6-E1 compressor, 6,000 PSI, Serial # 2A070501.

ITEM COMMENTARY (Background, discussion, key points, recommendations, etc.) Please identify any or all impacts this proposed action would have on the City budget, personnel resources, and/or residents.

The Fire Department has a Hypres SCBA compressor that was purchased in October 2005. It has needed repairs over the years on multiple occasions, but overall has served us well. The compressor broke down again in 2021. It was determined at that time that it wasn't financially feasible to repair it again. After discussions with Yakima County Fire District #5, it was decided that they would partner with us and we would purchase a new compressor. A new SCBA compressor was approved by the City Council last year and included in this year's budget. The new compressor has been purchased, installed and is now operational. The old SCBA compressor needs to be deemed surplus so it can be disposed of.

Yakima County EMS LEVY

A proposal to continue the countywide Emergency Medical Services (EMS)

Levy will be on the November 2022 general election ballot.

Yakima County voters first approved the EMS Levy in 1991 at 25-cents/\$1,000 of assessed property value.

The Levy was renewed in 1995, 2001, & 2012.

FACTS:

- The purpose is to renew the current EMS Levy at a rate of 25-cents/\$1,000.
- Renewing the EMS Levy will ensure the continued level of emergency medical and trauma care by local fire departments throughout Yakima County.
- The law requires that EMS Levy funds can only be used for emergency medical care, medical training, and supplies to provide EMS and rescue operations.
- Fire departments throughout Yakima County respond to nearly 20,000 medical emergencies annually.
- The EMS Levy provides annual EMS training to our firefighters.
- The total costs to certify our firefighters as Emergency Medical Technicians is paid using EMS Levy funds.
- EMS Levy funds also support the Yakima County Department of EMS, which
 provides training, continuing medical education, EMS certifications, quality
 assurance, and EMS system analyses throughout the County.

- La renovación de EMS Levy garantizará el nivel continuo de atención médica de emergencia y trauma por parte de los departamentos de bomberos locales en todo el condado de Yakima.
- La ley exige que los fondos de EMS Levy solo se puedan usar para atención médica de emergencia, capacitación médica y suministros para proporcionar EMS y operaciones de rescate.
- Los departamentos de bomberos de todo el condado de Yakima responden a casi 20 000 emergencias médicas al año.
- EMS Levy brinda capacitación anual de EMS a nuestros bomberos.
- El costo total para certificar a nuestros bomberos como Técnicos en Emergencias Médicas se paga con fondos de EMS Levy.
